FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear families,

The word 'legacy' has been on my mind recently, for a variety of reasons.

The anniversary of my father's death always makes me mindful of the legacy he left behind for our family. A simple man, he worked extremely hard - seven days a week for many years whilst we were young - and taught his children the value of doing a job well and making the most of opportunities. His legacy wasn't to leave a great financial inheritance but rather to teach his children how to succeed in life, and enjoy a life rich in contentment and strong self esteem. It came about through what he showed me – the way he spoke, the way he behaved and what he expected of his children.

I was really very fortunate. I was expected to follow the rules at home, contribute to keeping the house running, be respectful to my parents and be the best I could be. My parents rarely had anything to do with school; their English was poor and they trusted me to work hard.

What is the legacy you provide for your children? Every family is different, and each parent has their own decisions to make about what they believe it's important for their children to learn. Sometimes the values at home mirror those of school – learning, respect, responsibility and safety. Sometimes, they are very different values. Children can learn to behave differently in home and school, but when they have families of their own it's the values of their parents that will guide the way they in turn parent.

Which is why it's important to consider what you model to your children. If you value school and the opportunities it provides then you'll make every day count. Your children learn that school is important and they will teach their children to be at school every day they are well. Did you know that there are almost as many weekends and school holidays as there are school days in a year? The target 94% attendance allows for twelve days sickness a year, and still be on track to achieve the target.

It's worth the cost to have a holiday in the school holidays – in fact it's a huge investment in your children's future

Everyone understands a special event – the family get together that's a 'one off' or something you might do once in their schooling. If your family can plan the rest of their holidays in the designated holidays then that's what your grandchildren will likely be doing too. Until next time.


8th September

How do we learn our Number Facts in Year 2/3?



Simple answer: With fun!!!

The theory behind the reason why......being fluent with our number facts refers to the ability to recall the basic facts in all four operations accurately, quickly and effortlessly. When students achieve automaticity with these facts, they have attained a level of mastery that enables them to retrieve them

from long-term memory without conscious effort or attention. This allows students to free up their working memory and they can devote it to problem solving and learning new concepts and skills.

Each week this term, the year 3 students have been completing 'Number Fact drills'. Over the week, we use the same number fact, the same set of questions and we set the time for five minutes on a timer. Each student sets him or herself a personal goal – beat my score and beat my time. By the end of the week, with a new drill sheet, all the students have success and, the facts are retained.

It is so popular that the year 2 students wished to have their race against the clock with simple addition facts. The result was resounding success again—it was so much fun and there was an immediate follow up cry—"can we do that again tomorrow?" Who knew learning could be so much fun!!



Delayed start to Prep

Is your child arriving before 8.30am?

As staff begin supervision at 8.30am, please ensure your child is sitting in the undercover area, near the Prep/One

classroom. Whichever gate they enter, children are asked to

go straight to this area and wait there until 8.30am. They can then take their bags to classrooms/bag racks as $\frac{1}{2} \frac{1}{2} \frac{1}{$

their teachers have instructed, and then move to the quad

area for play.

We have, unfortunately, had items from lunchboxes being stolen, so we

It is not compulsory for your child to attend the Prep year as soon as they are old enough -5 by 30 June in the year they enrol. You can delay their entry by 1 year if you feel they are not ready, but when they start school, they should still start in the Prep year. Your child must be enrolled in school when they turn compulsory schooling age (that is, at least 6 years and 6 months). Parents who decide to delay their child's start in Prep may choose to keep their child at home or in an early childhood education and care service. Parents may also apply to access an Early Childhood Development Program for children with disability through existing regional processes. Please see Mrs Lever if you'd like to know more.

Consideration of Individual Circumstances

Staff at Clifton State School take into account students' individual circumstances, such as their behaviour history, disability, mental health and wellbeing, religious and cultural considerations, home environment and care arrangements when teaching expectations, responding to inappropriate behaviour or applying a disciplinary consequence. In considering the individual circumstances of each student, we recognise that the way we teach, the support we provide and the way we respond to students will differ. This reflects the principle of equality, where every student is given the support

they need to be successful.
